Viv Welham has made contact to say she is finally getting her CI on June 22 after having waited for a number of years.



Talkaround

Donna had had contact from Chris Read before Christmas. He used to belong to the Hearing Association a number of years ago. Also too he had been a reporter. Maxine suggested he would be great to have as a guest speaker.

Donald had recently purchased a new N6 processor. The FM one was an extra \$6,000.

Raewyn: I recently had to make a number of business contacts including the bank and insurance companies. They did not understand what the CI was and she had to tell them. Of particular interest the insurance company did not understand that there were internal and external parts involved.

Maxine: I think to get some interest and information about cochlear implants, we need to get someone on Shortland St as a cameo appearance.

Donna: Recently some CI people have had hospitalisation and we need to make sure our needs are covered.

Stuart: Make sure we don't have any MRIs.

Maxine: On scans, the magnets show up guite big.

Raewyn: We should be wearing our silicon bracelets or medic alert ones. (Both Raewyn and Gloria have silicon ones – but don't wear them ... hmmm).

Stuart: I heard about CICADA a number of years ago and get the newsletters. I wanted a copy of the book and thought I could pick it up at the forum (the launch was the same date). I didn't realise it was in Australia.

Donna: Some of the books on CICADA I am enquiring about getting copies of.

Laurie: 2 years ago I changed doctors – my old one retired. He didn't know anything about CIs.

Stuart: If your CI falls off, no one knows you have one. I have a medical alert and it costs an annual fee and the initial form needs to be completed by your doctor.

Maxine: Stuart you have some skills. You should help run the group.

Stuart: I found out about CICADA from John C when the social group was running at Carrington. It was in a pub, however it was noisy and one particular day a lady was singing and it just sounded like cats caterwauling.

Laurie: How often should we change our filters?

Stuart: The recommendation is every 3 months.

Donna: However I didn't change any for 2 years. It depends on whether you work in a dusty environment.

Raewyn: I noticed a huge difference in the clarity when I changed mine.

Vince: I lost my magnet. Simon (Cochlear) said I could wear a bandage until a new magnet arrived. When I went to the club, everyone wanted to know what had happened.

Donna: In the early days, I remember going to the university and Ellen said I had a donut on my head. This is because the magnet is too strong. Having been given a lighter one, it fell off in the early days until I got used to it.

Raewyn: I remember I got a donut also.

John: I play tennis and the processor falls off. I was told I have sensitive skin.

Stuart: You can alter the magnet to 'stick' better by slightly turning it.

Donald: It would be better to probably get a sports headband from Rebel.

Maxine: It would probably look cool as well.

Stuart: I wear a baseball hat which covers my ears when I am walking.

Laurie: I wear a hat also.

Raewyn: Reid Technology has those bandage-type headbands.

Maxine: With a hat it can be a bit annoying as the CI moves away from the magnet and continuity of sound is not guaranteed.

Donald: When I played tennis, the CI was the last of my problems. I couldn't play tennis very well ...

John: Which processor do I have?

Donna: Should have an N6 because you have been recently implanted. Read your manuals.

We continued talking about our surgery and some experiences and the casual meeting closed at approximately 12 noon.
